

Cultivating Workshop at Cedar Mountain Farm

My name is Moriah Bilenky and I am attempting to start a completely draft animal-powered vegetable farm. It really all started when I was 10 but I won't go back that far; things really got moving after I graduated from college last May. My plan and dream has always been to start my own farm, grow my own food and be a good steward of the land but what does that really look like?

I was looking at some farming videos on YouTube one day and I stumbled across a video of a horse drawn transplanter featuring David Fisher of Natural Roots. I knew instantly that I would combine my two passions – horses and farming for the ultimate goal of having a sustainable and self-sufficient farm. As soon as that switch flipped I had a clear picture of what my farming operation would look like so I went about doing everything I could to get the necessary experience and knowledge.



It started with a trip to Natural Roots in Massachusetts where I saw up close for the first time a demonstration of horse drawn equipment. From there I bought Stephen Leslie's book 'The New Horse Powered Farm' and I carried around with me and poured over every word. Later that summer I found out continued on page 3

about DAPNet and the Draft Animal-Power Field Days and I counted down the days until I would drive the 7 hours to Vermont. At the DAP Field Days I went to Stephen Leslie's talk about essential pieces of equipment, Jelmer Albada's cultivation tools and a hands-on mini lesson with Jay Bailey. That lesson was the first time I drove a team and the first time driving since I was 12. It was everything I imagined it would be!

From then on I was driven to find a mentor. I searched long and hard till I found a woman not too far from me with a pair of drafty Halflingers. She wasn't able to get them out as much as she wanted to so we were doing each other a favor. She taught me how to harness the horses and hitch them together. We drove them in the ring and on the road. I went up there as often as my schedule would allow.

I joined DAPNet and after I met my mentor I started getting involved with the DAPNet Facebook page. It was great to connect with like-minded people and surround myself with the wealth of knowledge that everyone brought to the table.

I was pleased to find out that DAPNet was offering a workshop on cultivating hosted by Stephen Leslie and I signed up right away. Finally! I would get to shake hands with and learn from the teamster that wrote the book that has been a great source for learning the basics as well as details on using horses in the market garden.

At the workshop I felt like I was with "my" people, an extended family even though we had just met - a great feeling for a person who is working toward starting my own animal-powered farm next season.




At Cedar Mountain Farm I was able to get a glimpse and information on many different types of tillage tools from a straddle-row cultivator to a walk-behind cultivator to the new Annie's All-In-One. It was great to see how Stephen modified each piece to fit his operation from different types of sweeps, to spacing, or even adapting a tool to become a multi-tool. Stephen gave demonstrations of each piece of equipment. Later many of the attendees got a hands-on mini lesson with the different types of equipment.

For me that was the first time using horse drawn till-

age tools. The hands-on aspect of the workshop was my main reason for attending (not having done an apprenticeship, I need all the hands-on experience I can get!) although the networking is valuable to me as well. Not only that, workshops on other draft-power farms allow me (and I'm sure others too) to pick up additional valuable information on how they run their operation, whether it be manure management, pasture rotation, or just little tricks that have worked for them.

I plan to stay as involved as I can with DAPNet and encourage folks in Pennsylvania working with animal-power to be join as well so we can grow this network! This is the future that I want to be a part of.






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
Alice Chalmers Tractor Reinvented as a PTO Forecart

What happens when you pull your uncle's Alice Chalmers tractor out of the woods and haul it home, one wheel hub dragging on the ground...? Well, when an imaginative brain gets ahold of an idea, anything is possible. My husband, Neal Perry was drawn to the idea of creating a ground-drive PTO forecart to pull with our team of Brabants, the Alice Chalmers WD45 was just the ticket. The goal was to be able to pull our 18' gyro tedder and possibly a haybine and/or baler with the horses.




Once the tractor was home he cut out the 4" poplar that was growing up through the middle and started designing the finished cart. New tires ("new" being a relative term) from the local garage stood it upright and his inventor/welder friend Phil came to check it out. "We'll cut it here and take this off and put that over there!" enthused Phil (insert various tractor part names as you see fit – I'm a horse farmer so most of those words don't translate for me). Soon the tractor was hauled to Phil's shop where surgery began.



The front end of the tractor was removed: motor, wheels and all. In it's place a hitch was welded on and some receivers for a pole or shafts.

Because the tractor has 4 gears on it, you have four speeds that the p.t.o can run. When we pull the tedder we can gear it down slow enough to be an effective double

gyro rake. Because the WD's have a hand clutch we can also shift on the fly which means the harder-to-turn implements like the haybine and baler can be started slowly and geared up on the fly, making it much easier for the horses to start the load. We can also engage an implement without stopping the horses.



Another great feature is the brakes which were left operable. Like any other farm tractor there is a brake for each wheel. This makes precision backing for hooking on to implements easy. A hydraulic pump & battery are mounted on the back so implements can be lifted up and down. The relatively heavy weight of the forecart is an advantage when it comes to turning the bigger equipment because it doesn't spin out or drag, whatever you hook behind it turns! The heaviness also makes it a very comfortable ride for the driver.

The forecart works very well on the tedder and will run our smaller baler, a Massey Furgeson 124 with four horses pulling it. The only limiting factor for the size of equipment that this forecart can run is the number of horses hooked to it. With 8 horses we could run our larger baler, a MF 228. We use three horses when we are tedding heavy hay, though when we use the gyro tedder to rake two windrows or ted second cut, two horses are fine.

The biggest issue we've found is that there is a tremendous amount of down-pressure on the pole when the p.t.o is engaged. To solve this issue, we hook it behind our Pioneer forecart so it takes the down-pressure and the horses just pull the load.



All in all, we are very pleased with the outcome of this experiment. The Alice Chalmers was a good choice for a tractor-to-forecart conversion. Of course there are a few details we would do differently next time, but such is the nature of a prototype, right? Look for more photos on our website: www.nealperryfarm.com

What a neat process to see a piece of junk get pulled out of the woods and come alive as a whole new beast – and a useful one at that!



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


